Equipping women: first aid training for equine wellbeing

Courage to chart new boundaries



Kuradiya Bander village in the Kutch region of Gujarat is largely inhabited by the fishermen community. Their livelihood depends upon fishing and selling their catch in the nearby town. The community also uses equines to transport fish and fishing equipment from their homes to the seashore and to the market. Brooke India (BI) first intervened in this village in 2020 and started the equine welfare project (EWP) for the welfare of the equines and the equine owners.

The upkeep of the equines is generally done by men, however, during the long fishing season of 9 months when the men are away, this work is done by the women. Women, with their limited understanding of equine handling, would often face challenges in providing basic care to the animals. Thus, they either wait for the men to return or use traditional remedies that might not work.

Safura Bai, a member of BI's women equine welfare group (WEWG) 'Sagar Ashwa Kalyan Sakhi Mandal', recognized this challenge. She participated in the capacity-building sessions being run by the BI staff. There she learnt about maintaining the first aid kit (FAK), making effective use of the medicines and identifying common equine diseases like colic, pain, wounds, etc. After two months of training, Safura Bai became a trained Ashwasakhi, she now looks after the welfare of the equines in her community.

Safura Bai had set an example by giving treatment to a wounded horse that was injured during the unloading of the fish from the boat. She cleaned the wound, applied medication, and dressed it, helping the horse recover quickly. Safura Bai's quick and timely action helped the equine to heal quickly. She now looks after 29 horses in her community. So far, she has treated 15 cases of colic, fever, and wounds. Her exemplary ways of working have not just helped the equines but have also raised the status of the women in the community. Safura Bai's journey highlights BI's dedication to improving equine welfare, strengthening women in the villages and empowering communities.

Farrier champion

Empowering local farriers



This inspiring story from Banda, a town in Uttar Pradesh demonstrates how the efforts of an equine owner, Mata Prasad, has benefitted the other equine owners in his village and adjoining villages. In Banda, the transportation industry heavily depends on equines, highlighting their vital role in local business. BI has been actively engaged in the region since 2018 and has adopted several measures to strengthen the community.

BI started capacity-building sessions for the local street farriers (LSF) in Banda. The farriers were identified for the training and were trained by the master trainer farrier (MTF).

Mata Prasad, an equine owner in Banda District, was hit by a tragedy after he lost his six mules due to Glanders, a deadly equine disease. This left him in a financial trap as he was in debt of the loan taken from the Brick Kiln (BK) owner. Devastated but not broken, Mata Prasad with his basic knowledge of hoof trimming earned his livelihood, and paid off his debt while running a family of 7 including his ageing parents, wife and three daughters. Recognizing his potential and after assessment by a MTF, BI nominated Mata Prasad for a Farrier training program. With BI's support, Mata Prasad was sent to the Flying Anvil Foundation India (FAFI) in Dunlod, Rajasthan for training. He completed the basic module in 20 days and learnt about anatomy, hoof management, and cold shoeing and became a certified farrier champion offering services in his region. BI supported him to purchase a farriery kit, of Rs. 1200 at 50% subsidy.

Mata Prasad now offers farriery services to equines in Banda, earning around Rs. 1500-2000 per month. He serves 30-40 equines monthly in nearby areas like Katra, Khutla, Manohariganj, Aliganj, and Hardaul Talliya. He also trains fellow equine owners in trimming techniques and has purchased two more mules with his earnings. From being an unskilled trimmer to a skilled farrier, Mata Prasad's progress highlights the impact of BI's intervention, which not only improved his financial situation but also reignited his passion for equines.

A tale of resilience: Raja the mule's road to recovery



In the picturesque village of Takora, Uttarakhand, equines play a vital role in the lives of residents like Vikram Kumar. These hardworking animals, particularly mules, are essential for transporting goods across the challenging mountain terrain, supporting livelihoods and daily needs. However, their work comes with risks, as highlighted by a recent incident involving Vikram's mule, Raja.

One day, Raja suffered a severe injury from a sharp metal peg while being tied up. Vikram made several efforts to contact a local veterinary officer but no one was available. In desperate need of help, Vikram reached out to BI's EWP, who responded swiftly to the emergency.

BI's Project Officer assessed Raja's condition and provided immediate treatment, including a Tetanus Toxoid injection, wound cleaning, and stitching. Recognizing the need for preventive measures, the team recommended safer pegs to prevent future injuries. Vikram promptly replaced all pegs, ensuring his mules' safety.

This incident underscores BI's commitment to improving equine welfare and empowering communities like Vikram's. Through its EWPs, BI not only provides immediate care and treatment but also educates owners on preventive measures and sustainable practices. By working closely with local communities, BI aims to create lasting change that benefits both animals and people.



Thanking BI, Vikram said, "Thanks to BI's intervention and quick action, helped Raja to recover quickly, just within a few days." The mule healed well and went back to work in 15 days, a testament to the effectiveness of BI's approach.





Akhil Bhartiya Kisan Mela, Pantnagar

BI participated at the Akhil Bhartiya Kisan Mela, in October 2023. The four-day event was held at G.B. Pant University of Agriculture and Technology (GBPUAT), where BI had set up a camp and engaged attendees through various activities. The event aimed to raise awareness and educate visitors, including equine owners, students, farmers, teachers, and other organisations, about equine diseases, their symptoms, causes, and prevention from the diseases.

BI spreaded extensive awareness by giving demonstrations, using flipbooks, pamphlets, and banners to the visitors at the camp.



During the camp, detailed information was provided on equine diseases. Additionally, topics such as the structure of the hoof, welfare-friendly handling and restraining, animal welfare frameworks, age determination, body weight estimation, face and leg identification marking, and common hoof diseases were also discussed. By participating in the Kisan Mela, BI showcased its commitment to ensuring equine welfare and spreading awareness about the lives of working animals.





Equine fairs

Animal health and welfare : BI Team

BI has undertaken impactful equine welfare efforts across 26 equine trade fairs, including the renowned Garh Ganga Fair in Garhmukteshwar Uttar Pradesh, Pushkar in Rajasthan, Devashariff in Barabanki Uttar Pradesh, Harihar Chetra Sonapur in Bihar, and Bhatner in Rajasthan, as well as Sarankheda in Maharashtra, among others. These equine events span various states such as Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Bihar, and Maharashtra, attracting a diverse population of over 90,000 equines. Serving as pivotal platforms to address equine challenges, these fairs have provided fertile ground for BI's initiatives.



BI has conducted over 60 awareness sessions focusing on disease prevention, management, and the promotion of good farriery practices, including ideal shoeing techniques, capacity building sessions of the local service providers, meetings with fair organisers for ensuring availability of all necessary resources at the fairs like water, shed, ramps and fodder etc.





From Research to Impact: Towards Just and Resilient Agri-Food systems

BI participated in the international conference 'From Research to Impact: Just and Resilient Agri-Food Systems' from October 9th to 12th, 2023, in New Delhi. The event was inaugurated by the Honourable President of India, Smt. Draupadi Murmu.

With over 500 participants from 60 countries, the conference highlighted innovative approaches to address gender inequality.

BI showcased the work of the different EWGs from the states of Gujarat, Haryana, and Maharashtra.



Awareness camp

An awareness camp on One Health was organised by BI in collaboration with the One Health Support Unit (OHSU) from 29th to 30th October 2023. The camp took place in Pathri, Haridwar, Uttarakhand. Several activities were conducted during the camp, including human health check-ups, treatment, and surveillance of zoonotic and non-zoonotic diseases through sample collection from humans, animals, and the environment. BI provided free medical check-ups, treatment, and deworming for equines and collected samples of blood, fecal matter, and pus from suspected animals. Additionally, samples of ticks were collected from the bodies of the animals.

Experts from various sectors such as the National Health Mission (NHM), Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), Health and Family Welfare Department of Uttarakhand, College of Veterinary Sciences at GBPUAT, Pantnagar, Animal Husbandry Department (AHD) of Uttarakhand, and Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) - National Research Centre on Equines (NRCE) participated in the camp. The camp brought together diverse groups of experts and community members to share knowledge, exchange ideas, and work towards the well-being of all.



Ashwamitra Sammelan



Fostering idea exchange and encouraging learning

BI's Ashwamitra Sammelan (AMS) is an annual event that brings together equine owners from diverse regions, fostering the exchange of experiences and insights. In 2023, three large regional AMS were held in Gandhinagar in Gujarat, Haridwar in Uttarakhand, and Lucknow in Uttar Pradesh. These sammelans provided equine owners with an exceptional platform to engage in cross-cultural learning, where they shared their challenges, exchanged innovative ideas and solutions, and participated in various team-building activities. The event also highlighted inspiring women leaders, showcasing their achievements.



VII Annual Convention of SVBBI

IVRI campus, Izzatnagar, Bareilly, Uttar Pradesh

The division of biochemistry at Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR)- Indian Veterinary Research Institute (IVRI), in collaboration with the Society of Veterinary Biochemists and Biotechnologists of India (SVBBI), celebrated its golden jubilee year with a special event. The 'VII Annual Convention of SVBBI and International Symposium on Multiomics to One Health: Challenges and Way Forward in Biomedical Research' took place at IVRI campus, Izzatnagar, Bareilly, Uttar Pradesh on December 14th & 15th, 2023. This event brought together experts in veterinary biochemistry and biotechnology to discuss the one health approach.

BI participated as an exhibitor, showcasing the work of the EWGs and raising awareness about the health and welfare of working equines and their communities, especially in remote areas.





Prevention of Donkey Skin Trade

To address the issue of the declining donkey population and illegal Donkey Skin Trade (DST), a one-day workshop was held in Barmer, Rajasthan. The awareness workshop took place in the presence of AHD officials, including Joint Director Dr. Narayan Singh, Deputy Director of Barmer Dr. Vinay Mohan, and 27 veterinarians. The event seamlessly integrated with the annual Government Veterinary Officers' (GVOs) workshop. The workshop effectively addressed critical equine welfare concerns and underscored the collective commitment to safeguarding the equine community and their well-being. Dr. Priya Pandey from BI conveyed the urgency to halt the DST, focusing on preventing donkey slaughter and the skin trade.



Unveiling EWOB: a leap forward in equid welfare assessment

Advocating for equine welfare, fostering collaboration, and inspiring action

BI conducted a rigorous three-day training program in Ambala to prepare assessors for the successful implementation of the new Equid Welfare Owner Behavior (EWOB) tool. The training took place from January 16th to 18th, 2024, with a team of 40 assessors and experts from the Monitoring & Evaluation and Animal Welfare & Health teams.

The program provided assessors with hands-on experience in assessing equid welfare and engaging with owners. Real-time data was captured during the training, helping the assessors to refine their skills. With the EWOB tool, the organisation aims to gain deeper insights into the impact of interventions, driving positive change for working equids and their owners.

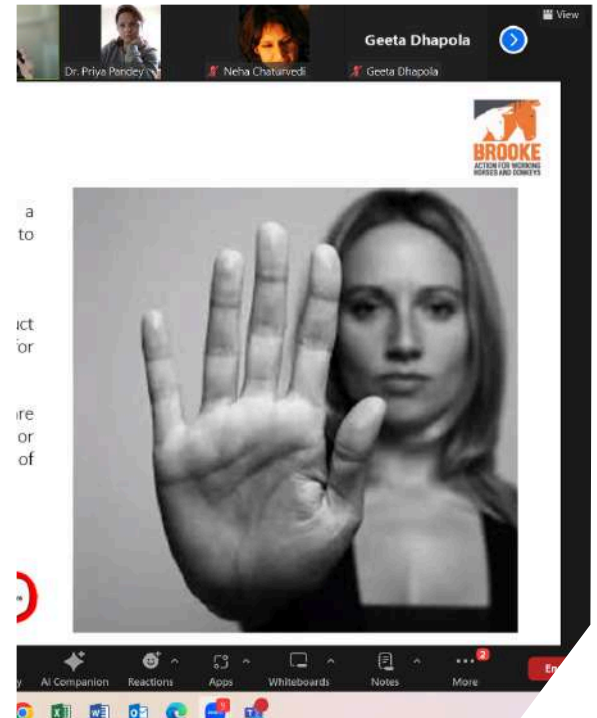


Safeguarding training

This largest CSR forum provided a chance to collaborate with the fraternity of social leaders, government agencies and developmental enthusiasts. BI had an opportunity to showcase the organization's work and spread awareness about the working equines and the equine-owning communities.

The team also learnt about the new strategies and the nationwide social impact being made by the other organisations. The organisation's work was much appreciated by experts from varying fields and departments present at the event.





Best practices for disposal of carcasses

BI, in collaboration with the National Academy of Veterinary Sciences-India (NAVSI), conducted a seminar on the One Health Approach titled "Best Practices for Disposal of Carcass" as part of the One Health series on January 20th, 2024. The event was attended by senior officials and experts from India's carcass disposal sector, including Dr O.P. Choudhary, Joint Secretary (NLM/PC) Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying (DAHD), Government of India (GOI).

The seminar focused on the importance of organized carcass disposal and featured discussions on existing practices, challenges, and plans. Technical sessions covered topics such as carcass disposal practices, relevant laws, safety standards, revenue generation from byproducts, and disposal during disasters. The seminar was attended by 38 participants, including officials, scientists, and veterinarians. Plans are underway for a follow-up seminar to gather additional stakeholder views.

Health today and beyond

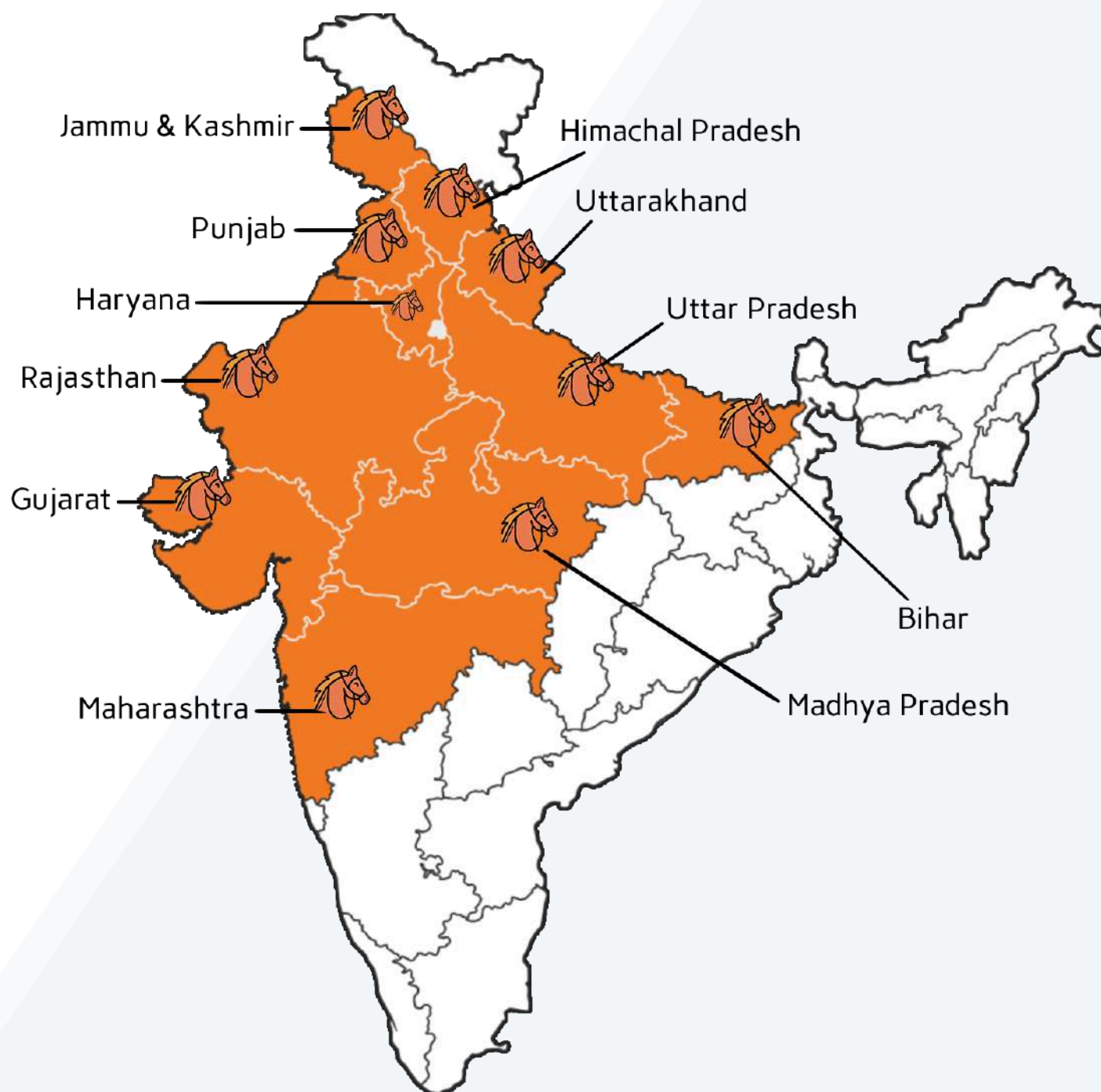
